Perfect Starmony

Song: "I'll Be Seeing You" (1938)

Songwriters: Irving Kahal & Sammy Fain

Brief Context: "I'll Be Seeing You," written by Irving Kahal and composed by Sammy Fain, was first performed in the musical *Right This Way* (1938), and included in the song's 1944 namesake film. "I'll Be Seeing You" only grew popular after Kahal's death, when Bing Crosby's cover became the #1 hit ballad for starcrossed lovers during World War II. In the 1950s, it became the theme song for The Liberace Show and has since appeared in several movie and television soundtracks.

Activity: Listening

Song: "Let's Do It (Let's Fall in Love)" (1928)

Songwriter: Cole Porter

Brief Context: Cole Porter's iconic "Let's Do It (Let's Fall in Love)" captures the cheeky spirit of a flirty summer romance. The lyrics explore the zoologically romantic habits of a variety of animals, from the birds and the bees to fish in the sea. The "Let's Do It" was featured in the musical Paris (1928), where Irene Bordini coyly sang the tune. The song became an immediate hit and set the stage for the future of American music to play with the boundaries of cultural norms.

Activity: Singing

What do you need?

Additional listening:

Did you know that Cole Porter was considered one of the most famous composers and lyricists of the 1920s/30s? Flamboyant and bold, Porter relished creating songs like "Let's Do It". His witty and suggestive lyrics caught the eye of censors, and the title was quickly changed to "Let's Do It, Let's Fall in Love." Recorded by: Frank Sinatra

Brief Context: Originally written in German by Heinz Meier and Hans Bradtke in 1965, Johnny Mercer adapted "Summer Wind" for English-speaking audiences. Mercer perfectly matched the song's ephemeral themes with Sinatra's lilting voice for the album *Strangers in the Night* (1966). "Summer Wind" explores feelings connected with memories spent with a past lover.

Activity: Movement

Suggested Seated Movement

Song: "The Way You Look Tonight" (1936)

Songwriters: Dorothy Fields & Jerome Kern

Brief Context: Winner of the Academy Award for Best Original Song in 1936, Fred Astaire sang "The Way You Look Tonight" for the film *Swing Time.* The Dorothy Fields' lyrics provide a sense of unconditional love as Jerome Kern's melody warmly washes over the listener. The song became a standard for artists to cover, with one of the most popular renditions recorded by Frank Sinatra in 1964.

Activity: Singing and Discussion

What do you need?

Suggested Discussion Prompt

Song: "Tea for Two" (1925)

Songwriters: Irving Caesar & Vincent Youmans

Brief Context: Known as one of the most performed songs of all time, "Tea for Two" was written by Irving Caesar and composed by Vincent Youmans for the musical *No, No, Nanette* (1925). Within the year, both Benson Orchestra and Marion Harris's recordings reached top of the charts. The Tommy Dorsey Orchestra starring Warren Covington later developed the ambitious rendition "Tea for Two Cha Cha" in 1958, which quickly became a #1 hit.

Activity: Listening

Instrument Activity

If you have access to formal rhythm instruments (egg shakers, rhythm sticks or maracas), listeners are encouraged to select an instrument of their choosing and shake or tap along to the rhythm! Listen closely for the moments of silence and FREEZE along with the instrumentalists.

If you don't have instruments, you might try creating a drum surface with a paper plate or tapping kitchen utensils together as makeshift rhythm sticks. Clapping your hands or tapping a part of your body to keep the beat works too!
